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## FOREWORD

The Gender Equality in Finland 2018 publication contains information on gender equality. The versatile publication offers data on the position of genders in various areas of society.

The data have been compiled from Statistics Finland's and other data producers' data. Statistics Finland's statistics are principally based on register and survey data that cover the entire population. The source material is often the Population Information System, for which reason the examinations are often limited only to legal genders: men and women.

The publication is now published as Gender Equality in Finland 2018 (formerly Women and Men in Finland). We wanted to draw attention to the diversity of genders and in this respect enable the extension of data contents as far as it is possible in future with regard to the datasets.

The publication is also issued in English. The publication is available as a printed product and as an electronic PDF version in both Finnish and English. ## The $19^{\text {th }}$ century

1860 - The husband's right to impose corporal punishment is no longer accepted in jurisprudence.
1864 - Unmarried women (at age 25) become legally competent and obtain full legal rights.
1878 - Equal hereditary rights for men and women.
1884 - The Finnish Women's Association, calling for universal suffrage for women, is founded.
1886 - The first mixed-gender school in Finland is founded.
1890 - The first public kindergarten is established in Helsinki (Sörnäinen)
1892 - Unioni, The League of Finnish Feminists - now known as The Feminist Association Unioni, is founded.
1897 - Women become legally competent at the same age as men, 21.

## The $20^{\text {th }}$ century

1900 - Suomen Työläisnaisliitto ("Finnish working women's association") is founded.
1901 - Women obtain equal right to study in universities.
1906 - Finnish women are the first in Europe to obtain suffrage in national elections and the first in the world to obtain the right to stand as candidates.
1907 - The bourgeois Finnish Women's Alliance is founded.
1907 - 19 women elected as the first MPs, many of them activists in various women's organisations.
1908 - Brothels in Helsinki (16) closed down

## The 1910s

1911 - The National Council of Women in Finland is founded.
1917 - Women and men obtain universal suffrage in local government elections.
1919 - Married women obtain the right to engage in gainful employment without needing their husband's consent.

## The 1920s

1926 - The first female minister of Government: Miina Sillanpää, Assistant Minister for Social Affairs.
1926 - Act on women's eligibility for state office.
1927 - Alma Söderhjelm becomes the first female professor at Åbo Akademi.

## The 1930s

1930 - A new Marriage Act takes effect: the guardianship of the husband over his wife is abolished and wives are given the right to own property in their own name.
1937 - The Maternity Benefits Act providing maternity grants is adopted.

## The 1940s

1943 - Statutory school meals.
1944 - The act on prenatal and child health clinics and also public health nurses.
1949 - First female to be elected to be Minister of Social Affairs, Tyyne Leivo-Larsson

## The 1950s

1950 - Therapeutic abortion is legalised.
1954 - First female to be elected Minister of Education, Kerttu Saalasti
The 1960s
1961 - Usage of the contraceptive pill is accepted.

1962 - Finland ratifies the ILO's Equal Remuneration Convention, calling for equal pay for work of equal value.
1965 - Women and men's joint association Yhdistys 9 is founded.
1967 - A committee analysing the position of women is founded (1967-1970).

## The 1970s

1970 - Final report by the committee analysing the position of women.
1970 - Over 20 percent of those elected to the Parliament are women for the first time.
1970 - First female to be elected Minister of Social Affairs and Health, Anna-Liisa Tiekso
1970 - The Act on the Interruption of Pregnancy: abortion is allowed for social reasons.
1970 - Human relationships and sex education become part of the school curriculum
1970 - The Employment Contracts Act prohibits discrimination.
1971 - Decriminalisation of homosexual acts.
1972 - Contraceptive services ensured by law.
1972 - The Council for Gender Equality (TANE) is founded.
1973 - The Day-care Act takes effect.
1973 - The first feminist women's groups: Marxist-Feministerna and Rödkärringar (PunaAkat).
1974 - Seta - LGBTI Rights in Finland is founded.
1975 - The UN International Women's Year.
1975 - The Paternity Act and Child Maintenance Act: children born in and out of wedlock obtain equal rights.
1975 - First female to be elected Minister of Justice, Inkeri Anttila
1978 - The right for parents to divide parental leave among themselves.
1979 - Finland's first women's refuges were set up in Helsinki, Turku, Oulu and Kotka.

## The 1980s

1980 - The First Government Action Plan for Gender Equality.
1980 - A law (taking effect as of 1 January 1982) is passed on the father's right to share parental leave with the mother even at a later stage
1981 - First female to be elected Minister of Trade and Industry, Pirkko Työläjärvi
1983 - Joint custody becomes possible.
1983 - For the first time in its history, over 30 percent of those elected to the Parliament are women.
1984 - First female to be elected Minister of Interior, Kaisa Raatikainen
1985 - The Children's Home Care Support Act; the terms maternity, paternity and parental leave are confirmed.
1986 -The Names Act, under which a woman getting married may keep her surname and the surname of either parent can be given to a child.
1986 - Finland ratifies the UN Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women (CEDAW).
1986 - Women obtain the right to act as priests (the first female priests are ordained in 1988).

1987 - The Act on Equality between Women and Men is adopted (Equality Act 609/1986. Into force 1.1.1987).
1987 - The Act on the Ombudsman for Equality and the Equality Tribunal (1986/609, repealed with Act 31.12.2014/1347 into force from 1.1.2015)
1988 - NYTKIS - The Coalition of Finnish Women's Associations is founded.
1988 - The first female priests were consecrated in the Evangelic Lutheran Church of Finland (94 persons)

## The 1990s

1990 - Children under the age of three obtain the subjective right to municipal day care.
1990 - First female to be elected Minister of Defense, Elisabeth Rehn - the first in the world.
1991 - Fathers obtain a separate paternity leave (6 days), which does not reduce the parental allowance period.
1991 - First female to be elected Minister of Environment, Sirpa Pietikäinen
1992 - The first female elected as the director of the Bank of Finland, Sirkka Hämälänen
1992 - The first female to be appointed the president of a university, Aino Sallinen/ University of Jyväskylä.
1994 - Rape within marriage is criminalised.
1994 - The first female to be elected Speaker of the Parliament, Riitta Uosukainen
1995 - The quota provision and the principle of gender mainstreaming are included in the revised Equality Act.
1995 - Voluntary military service becomes a possibility for women.
1995 - Gender-based discrimination is prohibited in the revised Constitution of Finland.
1995 - First female to be elected Minister of Foreign Affairs, Tarja Halonen
1995 - A woman becomes Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of Justice, Kirsti Rissanen
1995 - A woman becomes Permanent Secretary of the Ministry of the Environment, Hannele Pokka
1995 - First female to be elected Minister of Transport, Tuula Linnainmaa
1995 - First female to be elected Minister of Labour, Liisa Jaakonsaari
1995 - Miessakit Association (to support the mental, psychological and social growth of men) is founded.
1996 - Children obtain the subjective right to municipal day care until school age.
1996 - A woman becomes Mayor of Helsinki, Eva-Riitta Siitonen
1996 - Finnis Government's Plan of Action for the Promotion of Gender Equality
1999 - The Act on Restraining Orders.
1999 - The Penal Code's provisions on the right to sexual self-determination are revised.
1999 - Abolishment of certain sexual offence provisions (including prohibitions on homosexual acts and adultery).
1999 - First female to be elected Minister of Culture, Suvi Lindén
1999 - First female to be elected Minister of Health and Social Services, Eva Biaudet

2000 - The first female President of Finland, Tarja Halonen
2000 - A general prohibition of discrimination included in the revised Constitution of Finland.
2000 - A woman becomes member of the Board of the Bank of Finland, Sinikka Salo
2000 - A woman becomes Chancellor of a University, Leena Kartio / University of Turku
2000 - First female officer graduated from the cadet school, Titta Lindqvist
2001 - The Act on Registered Partnerships.
2003 - Paternity leave of one month
2003 - The first female appointed as captain in the Defence Forces, Mervi Pehkonen / Border Guard
2003 - First female to be elected Prime Minister, Anneli Jäätteenmäki
2003 - First female to be elected Minister of Foreign Trade and Development, Paula Lehtomäki
2003 - First female to be elected Coordinate Minister of Finance, Ulla-Maj Wideroos

## Unemployment benefits in Finland

In Finland, unemployment benefits are provided both by unemployment funds and by the Social Insurance Institution of Finland (Kela). The former pay out earnings-related benefits to fund members, while Kela provides basic unemployment benefits to other unemployed persons.

Unemployment funds pay earnings-related unemployment allowance to members of at least 26 weeks' standing, who meet the work requirement and are between 17 and 67 years of age. To meet the work requirement, a person must have completed 26 calendar weeks of eligible employment during the preceding 28 months.

Basic unemployment allowance is paid by Kela to unemployed persons aged 17 to 67, who meet the work requirement but are not enrolled in any unemployment fund. The entitlement to basic unemployment allowance and its possible supplementary parts is determined on the same grounds as for earnings-related unemployment allowance, except for membership in an unemployment fund.

Labour market subsidy is paid by Kela to unemployed persons aged 17 to 67, who have reached the maximum eligibility limit for the basic or earningsrelated unemployment allowance or, who are not entitled to unemployment allowance on account of not meeting the work requirement.
